Adverbs of Frequency		
Always	100%	I <u>always</u> eat breakfast before going to school.
Usually	90%	I <u>usually</u> go to school by bus.
Sometimes	50%	I <u>sometimes</u> eat fried fish for lunch.
Never	0%	I have <u>never</u> failed in any of my subjects.

Correct Word Order
Subject + Auxiliary Verb + Adverb + Main Verb
I have <u>always</u> completed my school works.
Raju has <u>always</u> lived in Texas.
Ahmad and Salim <u>usually</u> walk together to school.
My mother <u>usually</u> cooks lunch at 12.00 p.m.
I <u>sometimes</u> eat chicken curry with white rice.
He <u>sometimes</u> sleeps in the afternoon.
They <u>never</u> play tennis together.
We are <u>never</u> late for school.



Present Continuous Tense

Present Continuous Tense	
A present continuous tense is a verb form of a sentence used to describe an ongoing action, event, or something that is happening now.	
Subject + am/is/are + verb (-ing) They are singing on the stage now.	+
Subject + am/is/are + not + verb (-ing) They are not singing on the stage now.	-
Am/Is/Are + subject + verb (-ing) Are they singing on the stage now?	?

Present Continuous Tense	
Uses	Things happening now – I'm washing the plates.
	Temporary situations – She's staying with her grandmother.
	Future plans – We are having an online quiz next Monday.
Form	Affirmative – She is working at the school./I'm having my coffee.
	Negative – She isn't working at the school./I'm not having my coffee.
	Interrogative – Is she working at the school?/Are you having your coffee?
Time expressions	Now, at the moment, today, this week She's staying with her grandmother this weekend.
