



Pronoun Chart

	Subject Pronouns	Object Pronouns	Possessive Adjectives	Possessive Pronouns	Reflexive Pronouns
<b>1<sup>st</sup> person</b>	I	me	my	mine	myself
<b>2<sup>nd</sup> person</b>	you	you	your	yours	yourself
<b>3<sup>rd</sup> person (male)</b>	he	him	his	his	himself
<b>3<sup>rd</sup> person (female)</b>	she	her	her	hers	herself
<b>3<sup>rd</sup> person</b>	it	it	its	-	itself
<b>1<sup>st</sup> person (plural)</b>	we	us	our	ours	ourselves
<b>2<sup>nd</sup> person (plural)</b>	you	you	your	yours	yourselves
<b>3<sup>rd</sup> person (plural)</b>	they	them	their	theirs	themselves

Examples:

- The teacher will guide **us** for the event.
- I lent **you** the broom yesterday.
- Hasim would do anything to assist **them**.
- **Your** cleaning schedule is here.
- These clothes aren't **mine**.
- I clean the house **myself**.
- Anita sent the volunteer form **herself**.

## Demonstrative Pronouns

	Singular	Plural
<b>here</b> (something close by)	this	these
<b>there</b> (something far)	that	those

Examples:

- **This** is the broom.
- **These** are the brooms.
- **That** is the broom.
- **Those** are the brooms over there.

## Indefinite Pronouns

Indefinite pronouns	Example
somebody	<b>Somebody</b> was asking for help.
someone	<b>Someone</b> had fixed the telephone wires.
something	She wrote <b>something</b> on a piece of paper.
somewhere	I've seen the person <b>somewhere</b> before.
anybody	He is not friendly with <b>anybody</b> .
anyone	I don't care what <b>anyone</b> says.
anything	I don't know <b>anything</b> about volunteering.
anywhere	Did you go <b>anywhere</b> yesterday?
everybody	There is enough first aid kit for <b>everybody</b> .
everyone	<b>Everyone</b> should help each other out.
